RESPONDER'S 2ND BID

After Opener's rebid, **Responder** often has a fairly good idea as to Opener's distribution and strength.

Responder's rebid depends on whether they have:

- A Major fit (8+ cards in ♥'s or ♠'s between the 2 hands).
- Do <u>NOT</u> have a Major fit and still looking for a place to play.

RESPONDER'S 2ND BID WITH A MAJOR FIT

The first priority is always finding a Major fit. Opener confirms a fit by raising your Major when they rebid; and the level describes the strength of their hand.

Once you have found a Major fit, you need to 'do the math,' consider other factors that may make Game possible and decide.

Responder is not forced to bid again after a raise by Opener but can choose to bid if thinks Game (or Slam) is possible.

- Without Game values \rightarrow Responder passes.
- Unsure if Game values \rightarrow Raise to 3, inviting Opener to decide.
- With Game values \rightarrow Responder bids Game.



Without a Major Fit, Responder needs to consider...

- Could we have a fit in the unbid major?
- Is it possible to play Notrump?
- Do we have a Minor fit?
- Did Opener limit their HCP?
- Could we still have the values for Game?

When Opener denies a fit, **Responder** has to visualize what Opener's hand might look like based on their bids.

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COMMON HAND DISTRIBUTION PATTERNS

HAND PATTERN	PROBABILITIES
Shape	Probability
4-4-3-2	21.6%
5-3-3-2	15.5%
5-4-3-1	12.9%
5-4-2-2	10.6%
4-3-3-3	10.5%
6-3-2-2	5.6%
6-4-2-1	4.7%
6-3-3-1	3.4%
5-5-2-1	3.2%
4-4-4-1	3.0%

There are 39 possible shapes for a bridge hand. This chart shows the 10 most common and their frequency.

71% of all hands will be one of these top 5 distribution patterns.

And almost 48% of bridge hands have a balanced distribution (e.g., 4-3-3-3, 4-4-3-2 or 5-3-3-2).

Notice that <u>none</u> of the top 10 shapes contain a void.

LET'S TRY VISUALIZING OPENER'S HAND

DIRECTIONS



- Work together to review auctions and Responder's hand on pages 85-87.
- Note what Opener has promised and what they have denied.
- Consider what is implied by choice of bids within the context of the priority of contracts (e.g., if they rebid a minor, they are denying a balanced hand).
- Determine how many cards Opener might hold in each suit (it can be a range or less/greater than a #).
- Calculate what the possible HCP range is for the combined hands.
- Remove the cards from the SOUTH, EAST and WEST pockets for Board #1. Using only those cards, create a hand that resembles Opener's hand in shape and strength (HCP).
- Make notes about the hand built in your manual on pages 85-87.
- When finished, return the unused cards to the board and repeat with Boards #2 and #3.
- If time allows, go back and discuss if Responder should rebid and what their rebid might be.

Does Responder rebid?

When Opener denies a fit in **Responder's** major, **Responder** has to deduce what Opener's bid and rebid have indicated about their hand.

Think about whether you have Game values and if a Major fit is still possible. Evaluate the risk of bidding higher. A Major fit may be worth stretching for. If majors aren't possible; with Game values, NT is usually preferred over minors.


